The African and African American Studies Program offer courses in 9 disciplines that contribute to its interdisciplinary curriculum. University of Arkansas students can choose to declare a combined major or a minor in African and African American studies. The AAST Program is proud to support its highest achieving students with scholarships. The African and African American Studies Program continue to seek new and exciting ways to expand its academic offerings with the campus and the community.

AAST conducted a self-study in 2014 in which it was concluded that the program's goals and objectives included the following:

Goals:

- Students will critically engage and connect the inter- and multi-disciplinary themes of African and African American studies
- Students will be able to effectively communicate (oral and written) themes of African and African American studies
- Students will be able to connect course goals with other AAST courses in their program of study to provide a broad understanding of the impact of African and African Americans in the world
- Students will develop an appreciation of African and African American culture

Objectives:

- Critically evaluate scholarly works on African and African American studies
- Describe the basic principles guiding African and African American studies discourse
- Demonstrate knowledge of research techniques, documentation, organization, style and mechanics of academic writing
- Apply African and African American centered theories, approaches, concepts, and empirical research to multiple disciplines

Procedure for future Assessment of Goals and Objectives

The AAST Program will implement a more structured assessment of program success beginning Fall 2016. This will include pre and post test for two courses that provide an introductory understanding of African and African American Studies. The assessment will be given in both online and face to face course offerings.

AAST 1003: Introduction to African and African American Studies

This course is an introduction to the interdisciplinary study of Africa and African Americans and their impact on the world order and society with an emphasis on that impact's manifestations in the United States of America.

AAST 2003 African American Experience:

Examines various facets of African American culture that collectively construct the African American experience including art, literature, drama, migration, film, and education. Covers issues facing African Americans through a cultural and socio-political context to understand and appreciate African American impacts on the United States.

The program will also develop an Exit Survey and Questionnaire for a) Students who participate in the biannual Ghana Study Abroad Trip b) Graduating Minors and Majors. The survey and questionnaire will provide qualitative and quantitative measures to determine the level of exposure students had with the various disciplines within the AAST program as well as their engagement with the program offerings.
