Academic Program Assessment Report

M.F.A. Program in Creative Writing & Translation

Assessment Tools

As outlined in our Academic Program Assessment Plan, the Program in Creative Writing and Translation uses the following assessment tools for student learning outcomes:

- A combined thesis defense and oral examination.
- A yearly review of each student's academic progress toward the M.F.A. degree.
- An indirect review of our graduates' professional success via published works, national program rankings, and anecdotal evidence.

Assessment Results

<u>Thesis defense/oral exams</u>: As of May 3rd. 2024, all 12 M.F.A. students eligible to graduate this spring had successfully written and defended a thesis manuscript that was deemed publishable by their thesis committees. Through oral examination, the committees were satisfied that graduating candidates were leaving the program with a broad knowledge of literature and technique.

<u>Graduate success</u>: In its latest ranking of M.F.A. programs, *Poets & Writers* placed the University of Arkansas M.F.A. program 8th in the nation (out of ~150 programs) for job placement and 18th for post-graduate fellowships. Among the many accomplishments of our students and graduates this year:

Student and Alumni Accomplishments

- Rising fourth-year M.F.A. student Joaquín Gavilano was awarded a Student Artist grant and recognized by <u>Artists 360</u> for his work in literary translation. Artist 360 grants are awarded by the Walton Family Foundation and Mid-America Arts Alliance.
- Two poems from rising fourth-year MFA Cal Paule's forthcoming debut collection, "Black Box Named Like to Me" (Ugly Duckling Press) will appear in an upcoming issue of the Paris Review.
- CW concentration undergrad alum Caroline Jennings' poetry chapbook Stop and Smell the Fractals (and Everything in Between) was published in November by Finishing Line Press
- Second-year poet Claire Scott won the <u>West Trade Review</u> Prize for Poetry.
- Recent graduate Elizabeth Muscari was nominated for Best New Poets by Booth Literary Journal this Spring.
- Alumna Julia Paginelli-Marin has been awarded a Community Activator grant by Artists 360 to expand the reach of Bee Balm Arkansas, "a community writing workshop, reading series and publication" founded by Paginelli-Marin in 2022. Paginelli-Marin will use

grant funding to develop curriculum for community poetry-writing workshops, bring visiting writers to Northwest Arkansas and produce the organization's second volume in their chapbook series.

- Paganelli-Marin has also been awarded a creative exchange fund grant by CACHE to expand the reach of Bee Balm Arkansas.
- Poetry alum Jacob Shores-Argüello has been awarded the John Guare Writers Fund Rome Prize, a Gift of Dorothy and Lewis B. Cullman for his work, "River Citizen."
- Bayou Magazine nominated 2022 poetry alum Amelie Langland's poem, "Listed in the Lagniappe" (Issue 78) for the Pushcart Prize.
- Translation alum Anna Vilner's translation of Hebe Uhart's "The Preparatory School" the August 31st, 2023 issue of The New Yorker.
- Vilner's translation of "A Memory from My Personal Life," by Hebe Uhart was published in the Paris Review in December 2023.
- Poetry alum Adam Clay's latest poetry collection, *Circle Back* was released by Milkweed Editions in early 2024.
- Americana, a film written and directed by alum Tony Tost, was released in 2023.
- Recent graduate CD Eskilson's two books are forthcoming in 2025: "Scream/Queen" (poetry) from Acre Books (Spring 2025), and "Poems / Dikter" (translated poetry collection) (1916), by Edith Södergran, forthcoming from World Poetry Books (Spring 2026). CD was also nominated for Best New Poets by Beloit Poetry Journal
- Alumna Alison Pelegrin has been named Louisiana Poet Laureate 2023-2025. Alison's most recent poetry collection, "Our Lady of Bewilderment" (LSU Press) won the Phillip H. McMath Book Award in March 2024.
- *The Bass Reeves Trilogy* by alum Sidney Thomson has been adapted for television as Western drama series *Lawmen: Bass Reeves* on Paramount +. Thompson is a consultant for the show.
- Poetry Magazine featured two poems, "Thorazine at 10 a.m." and "Pharmhouse" by alum Brody Parrish Craig in their July/August 2023 issue. Craig's new collection of poems, "The Patient Is an Unreliable Historian" will be released by Omnidawn in 2024.
- "Ghost Forest" a new collection of poems by alum and former Louisiana Poet Laureate Jack Bedell was released by Mercer University Press in early 2024.
- Alum Jen Jabaily-Blackburn's first book of poems, "Girl in a Bear Suit," was selected by Christopher Citro as winner of the 2023 Elixir Press Annual Poetry Prize and will be released in April 2024
- The fourth season of fiction alum Nick Pizzolatto's "True Detective" premiers in January, 2024. Pizzolatto acts as an Executive Producer of the show, which he created and wrote from 2014-2019.

• And hundreds of poems, stories, novels, essays, and translations by graduates were published by well-known presses such as Milkweed Editions and in journals such as and *Beloit, Booth, The Paris Review, The New Yorker, Bayou Magazine, and Poetry Magazine,* among others.

Use of Results

Almost without exception, students in the M.F.A. program graduate within four years. These students produce publishable manuscripts, and many go on to prestigious post-graduate fellowships and residencies, as well as careers in teaching and writing.

In 2017, the Program in Creative Writing and Translation began teaching ENGL 2023, Creative Writing I, as a core course. Assessment data has consistently revealed that our student instructors consistently excel at teaching the course according to stated student learning outcomes and are therefore gaining valuable teaching experience for their professional resumes.

- Our faculty-founded, M.F.A. student-run literary journal, *The Arkansas International*, published its 15th issue. M.F.A. students comprise the editorial board of *The Arkansas International*, through which they're gaining significant professional experience in editing and publishing.
- Uchenna Awoke, our inaugural *Arkansas International* Writer-at-Risk, moved to Northwest Arkansas just over a year ago. The program, spearheaded by Prof. Padma Viswanathan, has been supported in large part by Chancellor's Grant funds awarded to Prof. Viswanathan.
 - Uchenna's first novel, <u>The Liquid Eye of a Moon</u>, forthcoming this summer. He has spent much of his time in Fayetteville writing, but he's also done readings, taught a fiction-writing workshop at the Fayetteville Public Library and participated on a panel sponsored by the University of Arkansas's Scholar at Risk Committee. For this, we also welcomed a visit by Alison Russo, Executive Director of the APF, who was very pleased with what she saw of the program. This Spring, he accepted an offer of a fully funded MFA at the University of Iowa.
