## BSW Program & MSW Program

## May 14, 2025

The School of Social Work is accredited by the Council on Social Work Education. We received reaccreditation in October of 2024 and will reapply for accreditation in 2031. We were accredited under the 2015 Educational Policy and Educations Standards (EPAS) for Baccalaureate and Master's Social Work Programs. However, the newest accreditation standards are now complete, and all accredited programs have until July 1, 2025, to adjust their curriculum, goals, and objectives to align with the 2022 EPAS for BSW and MSW Programs.

#### **Mission Statements**

In 2025 we updated our School, MSW Program, and BSW Program Mission Statements to align with the new accreditation standards.

## **School of Social Work Mission Statement**

We are dedicated to fostering a community of culturally competent, anti-oppressive social work leader-practitioners. Our program develops generalist leader-practitioners prepared for empirically based and multi-system practice through the integration of classroom, field education, and experiential learning. Learning takes place within an intentional collaborative

community that promotes inclusion to improve the quality of life for vulnerable persons, families, groups, organizations and communities in Arkansas and globally.

## **Curriculum Review and Modifications**

The School of Social Work curriculum committee has been working over the past year to align our curriculum to the newest standards. They have completed a curriculum matrix for every core course across both the BSW and MSW programs that aligns each courses goals, objectives, readings, and assignments with the 2022 EPAS requirements. Syllabi have been updated to reflect the new accreditation standards with relevant readings and assignments. We took this opportunity to reduce the duplication of some reading and assignments. Many assignments were changed to infuse new and innovative assignments and learning opportunities.

## Program Assessment Tools and Plan for 2025-2026

Because of the change to the newest accreditation standards, a new assessment plan and new tools were needed to accommodate the changes. We had also decided as a faculty that the tools we were using were not adequately assessing student knowledge as they were written and being utilized. As such, we are changing the tools, but not the intervals at which we assess.

## **BSW Program:**

Learning outcomes for BSW students are measured in Fall, Spring, and Summer and will include 2 measures. Each of these measures examines competencies in 9 domains and the scores are averaged across each other and presented in the aggregate.

- 2. The Final Assignment in Practice III Rubric

# MSW Program:

Learning outcomes for MSW students are measured in the Spring for both students graduating and not graduating (depending on the program) and will include 2 measures. Each of these measures examines competencies in 9 domains and the scores are averaged across each other and presented in the aggregate.

- 1. The Final Field Evaluation Rubric
- 2. The Capstone or Thesis Evaluation Rubric
